THE U.S. RECEPTION AND PLACEMENT PROGRAM OVERVIEW (PROVIDER VERSION)

The following worksheet can be used to guide participants' understanding of the United States Reception and Placement Program Overview **fact sheet**, **podcast**, and **video**. The second activity is best paired with the video. The information across these three resources are the same. You may add additional statements, images, and information based on participant needs.

PART I: AGREE OR DISAGREE

Ask participants to answer the following questions. You may first ask them to answer without the fact sheet (podcast or video), and then provide them with the fact sheet (podcast or video) to check themselves. You may give them the statements to complete independently, or in groups, or read them out loud. You may provide additional information as necessary after each statement.

- 1. The resettlement office will only help you during your first 24-hours in the U.S. (Disagree)
- 2. You will be responsible to find and enroll in a English language class. (Disagree)
- 3. Cultural Orientation will help you learn more about your new community. (Agree)
- 4. In the U.S., you are protected by the same laws that protect all U.S. residents. (Agree)
- 5. Resettlement staff will work with you to develop and implement a plan to help you achieve self-sufficiency. (Agree)
- 6. After you are in the U.S. for one year, you and your family can apply to become U.S. citizens. (Disagree)

PART II: REQUIRED SERVICES MATCHING

Ask participants to match the images of required services on the left with the description of the service on the right. You may ask them to answer while watching the video or after watching the video. Consider asking additional follow-up questions about each service. Depending on the group, individuals may generate responses in pairs or groups, or you can have them respond directly to you. Adapt answers to your local context and/or participant needs.



Interpretation for required services will be provided, as needed



Every adult in your family will be given a small amount of money for personal spending.



Enrollment in employment services.



Assistance to register your children in public school, which is free.



Help to find and enroll you in an English language class, if you and your family do not speak English.
